The GREAT Network is an international partnership whose goal is to facilitate the efforts of local stakeholders focused on enhancing maternal and perinatal health in low and middle income countries through the implementation of evidence-based guidelines.



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New publications featuring work from the GREAT Network

Two-year follow up on recommendations to improve the use of maternal health guidelines in Kosovo

A paper authored by Dr. Julia Moore and colleagues has been accepted for publication in the BMC Public Health Journal and is currently in press. This paper describes the results of a study that involved conducting a qualitative process evaluation of progress, barriers, facilitators, and proposed solutions to operationalize nine recommendations to prepare Kosovo to implement the WHO 2012 prevention and treatment of postpartum hemorrhage (PPH) guideline. Focus groups and one-on-one interviews with participants from the first meeting in Kosovo were conducted to evaluate progress on the nine recommendations. While progress has been made towards implementation of some of the recommendations, scale up has been limited by barriers. Based on participant feedback in this study, the recommendations were refined to facilitate operationalization in Kosovo. The findings of this process evaluation are transferrable to other areas of maternal health work and implementation of evidence-based guidelines, particularly in LMIC settings.

Barriers, facilitators and priorities for implementation of WHO maternal and perinatal health guidelines in four lower-income countries: a GREAT Network research activity

A paper authored by Dr. Joshua Vogel and colleagues has been accepted for publication in the Public Library of Science (PLoS) One. The paper describes the results of a study that used a systematic approach, based on the knowledge-to-action (KTA) model, to incorporate evidence and theory to identify barriers and facilitators to implementation of WHO maternal health guideline recommendations in four lower-income countries. A mixed-methods study was conducted in each of the countries (Myanmar, Uganda, Tanzania, and Ethiopia). Activities included stakeholder surveys, in-person workshops at which focus group discussions and prioritization exercises took place, and the development of an implementation plan. Barriers identified across different countries were often similar, despite differences in guideline priorities and contexts. Stakeholders identified tailored strategies to address local barriers and leverage facilitators. While further evaluation of the impact of implementing identified strategies is needed, this approach to identifying barriers, facilitators, and potential strategies for improving implementation proved to be feasible in these four lower-income country settings.
